

Pewee Valley Fire Department Celebrates 75 Years with Parade, Concert

Pewee Valley, Kentucky.- The Pewee Valley Fire Department will celebrate 75 years of service to the community with a parade, concert, and barbecue on September 11th in Pewee Valley. The parade will begin at 6:30 p.m. and the route will be on Mt. Mercy Drive from Houston Lane east to the Town Square. Following the parade, the community can enjoy hamburgers, hot dogs and brats while enjoying music from the Wulfe Brothers.



The eighth regular meeting of the Pewee Valley City Council was held on Monday, August 2, 2004. In attendance were Michael Logsdon, Bob Rogers, Steve Rowland, Suzy Walser, Beach Craigmyle, and Kevin Arave. Also in attendance were City Clerk Mimi Barrett, Mayor Clayton Stoess, Jr., and City Attorney John Singler.

AUGUST COUNCIL MEETING

POLICE REPORT

Chief Steve LeClair thanked residents for their help with storm clean up. Chief LeClair reported that there were 31 traffic stops, 5 arrests, 4 motorist assists, 7 alarm runs, 2 domestic disturbances, 4 accidents, 3 injury involved accidents, 4 assists to other agencies, 4 suspicious activities and 2 D.U.I.'s for the month of July. Traffic stop locations were:

EMS REPORT:

Council Member Bob Rogers reported that there were 18 EMS runs during July.

COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS

Environmental Properties

Mr. Arave reported that the junk pick up day (July 29th) went well. The next scheduled junk pick up day will be posted. He stated that he is tentatively going to schedule it around the Christmas holiday.

Communications/Records

Mr. Craigmyle reported that the City's application for a grant from the Department for Libraries and Archives' Local Records Program has been approved in the amount \$4,150.00 for the codification of the City's ordinances and final required legal review.

Public Safety

Mr. Logsdon suggested that the City purchase road emergency materials for road closures, storm damage, downed power lines, etc. The City has limited means to properly mark closed roads. He made a motion to spend \$800.00 on emergency road equipment for the City, which was unanimously approved by the Council

Festivities

Ms. Walser reported that the Summer Band Festival would be held on Saturday, September 11th from 6:00p.m. to 9:00 p.m. at City Hall and The Pewee Valley Women's Club. There will be a band (the Wulfe Brothers Band), a clown, and a face painter. T-shirts and cups will be sold at the event. The Pewee Valley fire department will hold a parade that will start at 6:30 p.m. at the Fire House and proceed through town.

The Council unanimously approved Ms. Walser's motion to spend \$4,000.00 for the Summer Band Festival (with \$1,606.00 being reimbursed from the sale of t-shirts and cups).

OLD BUSINESS

The City Engineer, Mel Milburn, gave a short presentation on the status of road and bridge repairs. He also presented the Council with a topographical map of Pewee Valley that will be a useful tool for long term planning.

HWY 146 Drainage- The survey and design for the drainage work on HWY 146 are complete; an encroachment permit has been submitted to CSX (the catch basin for the drainage is on railroad property), along with a \$750 fee, seeking permission to perform the work. Work cannot begin until the expiration of CSX's 30 day review period.

Cherry Hill Road Resurfacing- Mr. Milburn recommended Flynn Brothers Contracting, Inc. as the contractor for this work, at a cost of \$14,723.00.00. The project will take two days, weather permitting. Cherry Hill Road will not be closed, but there access will be limited. The Council unanimously accepted the Flynn Brothers bid.

Bridge Culvert Replacement- Mr. Milburn reported that all permits have been received for the work on the two bridges; pipe has been ordered and should be delivered soon. The rest of the materials will be ordered and delivered to the road department. Some

issues of concern are the trees growing through the Rollington Road bridge. The Council needs to get authorization to remove the trees. There are also trees in the way of the design of the Cherry Lane bridge. Mayor Stoess suggested that the request for authorization be submitted to the Tree Board immediately due to the condition of the bridges and the urgency to complete the work.

NEW BUSINESS

APPOINTMENT OF NEW TREASURER

Upon the recommendation of Mayor Stoess the Council voted unanimously to name Pewee Valley resident Stan Clark as the new City Treasurer.

FIRST READING OF SCHOOL CAPACITY ORDINANCE

The first reading of the School Capacity Ordinance was presented. The purpose of this ordinance is to ensure that, to the maximum extent practical, approval of new residential development will be granted only when it can reasonably be expected that adequate public school facilities will be available to accommodate the development. After discussion, the Council voted to have the first reading of this ordinance, Mr. Logsdon opposed.

FIRST READING TAX ORDINANCE FOR 2004-2005

The first reading of the Tax Ordinance for 2004-2005 was presented and discussed with the Council members. The ad valorem

and personal property tax rates for the fiscal year 2004-2005 is fixed at the rate of \$0.1750 dollars (17.50 cents) per hundred dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property as assessed for taxation.

TEXT AMENDMENTS TO THE OLDHAM COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION

Mr. Craigmyle presented to the Council a proposal for text amendments to the Oldham County Planning Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance, to be submitted to the Oldham County Planning Commission. The purpose of the text amendments is to ensure that the minimum lot size in Pewee Valley is one acre.

In other new business, the Council voted unanimously to advertise for bids for the Fiscal Year 2004 Audit Report. Also approved was a motion to spend \$500.00 to purchase a fire proof safe for the Police Department.


There being no further business, after payment of the City bills, the Council meeting was adjourned.




