## Chipping away at the storm's aftermath

The City of Pewee Valley made the decision to contract with Clean Cut Trees out of Louisville to clean up the storm debris on the secondary roads in our Town. With over 13 miles of roads, the contractor spent 13 straight days, working 12 hours a day, filling an estimated 60-70 truckloads.

The County Road Department was originally slated to handle the clean-up, however, there was no guaranteed timetable and the County expected the City to sign an interloper agreement (requiring repayment of expenses to the County within 30 days), even though the majority of these costs would be reimbursed by FEMA. Since the residents of Pewee Valley pay hundreds of

## MARCH COUNCIL MEETING

The regular meeting of the City Council of Pewee Valley was held on March 2, 2009. In attendance were Mayor Bob Rogers, Council Members Dick Filippini, Bethany Major, Amy Johnson, Dana Barrette, Will Chambers and Carol Akers. Also in attendance were City Attorney John Singler and City Clerk Laura Eichenberger.

## FINANCIAL REPORT

No report given.

## OPEN COMMENTS

Gary Hubbuch, of St. Aloysius addressed the City Council and those present regarding issues of the lighting on the church's property and complaints from nearby residents. Mr. Hubbuch relayed the Church's perspective that it had entered into the 2005 Agreement in good faith with the City and stated that the Church attempts to be considerate of the residential neighbors, as well as a good steward of the community, while providing a safe environment for its parishioners. Mr. Hubbuch stated that St. Al's adds value to the community and has a long history dating back 125+ years in this area.

The Agreement established approval of use of two styles of lights (acorn or shoebox) for the parking lot. The shoebox style was selected as the least disruptive to the community for its directional and focusing capabilities.

Mr. Hubbuch reported that St. Aloysius has talked with the City Engineer over the lighting situation. A walk-through has been done. It is agreed that there is back-flow lighting from the candle lights on the edge of the property. Chip Lanham (one of three certified lighting experts in the state) recommended moving the shoebox lights to the center island to focus on the parking lot and keep back flow lighting from affecting adjacent residential properties.

Mr. Hubbuch stated to the Council that St. Aloysius wants to cooperatively work with the City to reach an agreement, avoiding court procedures, to solve the lighting issue to the mutual satisfaction, and at the least expense, for both the Church and City residents.

Mayor Rogers stated that the City and the Church can work together to provide a written plan for correcting the problematic lighting by lowering poles, repositioning lights, etc. City Engineer Mel Milburn will meet with Mr. Hubbuch to draft a written proposal/plan to present to the City Council for correcting the direct and back-flow lighting that has created a disturbance to adjacent property owners. Mr. Milburn's written review, dated February 25, 2009, will be used to identify the specific lighting issues for correction. Once the written plan is ready for review, a special meeting of the City Council can be called, if necessary.

Mayor Rogers announced that copies of the lighting ordinance and the City Engineer's February 25th report will be available at Town Hall, Monday - Friday, 9:00 a.m. -12:00 p.m.

Resident Greg Wilson stated that there are seven lights shining directly into and all throughout his home. There are some lights that were never there before and have just now started shining toward the home. He also informed the Council that he has digital photos illustrating how much glow he is getting from the church lights.

Beach Craigmyle informed the Council that he was the author of the lighting ordinance and would be glad to help with the current issues.

He noted that ten different city ordinances from cities nationwide were reviewed during the writing process. The lighting ordinance, as it was adopted, was pretty standard and intentionally kept simple. Mr. Craigmyle also stated that the light (from St. Aloysius) is so bright that it is temporarily blinding. The lighting ordinance provides a threshold of 1800 lumens and a single flood light puts out 1300 lumens. One of the 400 watt high-pressure sodium lights used by St. Al's puts out 50,000 lumens. There are 24 of these 400 watt high-pressure sodium lights at St. Aloysius.

Resident Stan Fitch commented that while the previous City Council did indeed reach an agreement with St. Aloysius, the Agreement was made at the time the lighting ordinance was in process. (the Lighting Ordinance passed 14 days after the Agreement was reached). Mr. Fitch feels it is wrong to revisit the issue now. He added, with respect to Mr. Wilson's complaint, that he believes that with the light meter 40 feet off the trespass, there is no violation.


Resident George Farmer, stated that the lighting ordinance has nothing to do with the Agreement where the only specification was shoebox or acorn style lights. Mr. Farmer stated that as a member of the church he was appalled that money has to be spent on moving lights. He also was concerned that tax money was being spent to cut down trees in Pewee Valley (referring to the crew on Mt. Mercy). Mayor Rogers noted that the tree work on Mt. Mercy was Fall clean up from the Hurricane Ike wind storm---and FEMA is paying for the work. The trees have to be taken down

## POLICE REPORT

Mayor Rogers publicly acknowledged that Chief Mike Losik did an excellent job during the ice and snow storm.

Chief Losik noted that during the recent power outage many residents used generators and he noticed some were running right at the garage doors. This is extremely dangerous as residents can be overcome with carbon monoxide. Generators should be run 15 feet away from doors and windows. Please read all directions before operating them for your own safety. There was an article about generator use in the February issue of The Call of the Pewee.

Chief Losik asked all residents who have not filled out a PREP form to please do so. If there are any changes to the PREP form, please let us know. It is important to the city in order to have an updated emergency notification list.

## ANNOUNCEMENTS

**Ice Storm Debris Clean Up** - Mayor Rogers reported that he attended a meeting earlier today with FEMA and representatives from Oldham County. It will be months before Oldham County can pick up the storm debris. They are concentrating on county roads first and there are miles of roads.

Mayor Rogers recommends the City hire a contractor to clean up storm debris. We have two bids from tree contractors and one contractor can begin immediately.

**Shovel Ready Projects** - The City submitted a letter to the Governor's office regarding Shovel Ready Projects (projects that are to the point of being within 60 days of starting) requesting \$65,257 for Cherry Lane and \$53,805 for Elm Street. The Shovel Ready Project request is in response to the Governor's Office requesting submissions for monies from the stimulus package coming out of Washington, D.C.

**Tree City Award** - Congratulations and thank you to Jim Brewer and the Tree Board for their accomplishment in receiving the Tree City designation again for 2008. The Tree City status will help the City with the Storm Water project.

**Emergency Management** - Mayor Rogers reported a debriefing attended by the Emergency Management Director, representatives from the fire department, school board, Baptist Hospital Northeast, Red Cross, etc. The County and Red Cross are working on setting up an emergency shelter (generator-ready) in Oldham County. It is a massive undertaking. Overall, the Red Cross thought that Oldham County did a good job handling emergency shelter and services during the ice storm.

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## COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS

**Dick Filippini** (Tree Board): Dick Filippini reported that 75--80% of the Hurricane Ike work has been completed by Beechwood---and should easily be completed by the March 15th deadline.

The Tree Board has designated April 25, 2009 as Arbor Day. Currently, we are not planning a "Trash for Trees" event or tree distribution---there is not enough money left in this fiscal year's budget after the storm damage clean up expenses. Mayor Rogers noted that the Tree Board budget has been stretched due to the two storm debris clean up expenses. All the FEMA forms have been submitted and we are still waiting to receive 12% from the State.

**Bethany Major** (Town Hall/Festivities): No report given.

**Carol Akers** (Public Safety): Carol Akers reported meeting with Stan Fitch and LG&E to discuss street lights in the City - the double lights at the corner of Central (on the phone pole) and the short black light that are almost under each other, as well as a couple of street lights in front of St. Aloysius. The City is under contract with LG&E

(it was noted that the contracts can be moved from one pole to another). The street lighting issue is part of the general complaint about lighting at St. Aloysius.

Dana Barrette motioned to make a resolution to remove any unnecessary lights in the City of Pewee Valley - even if the City has to finish making contractual payments. The motion was seconded by Amy Johnson. All Council members voted in favor with Will Chambers abstaining.

(It was noted that all the porch light bulbs are out at Town Hall. Carol Akers and Bethany Major are to take care of the porch light bulbs.)

Ms. Akers reported two historical signs are broken and not in place. The Confederate Cemetery sign was struck by a car and the sign on Highway 146 (by the caboose) is in pieces. Julie Hardaway with the Daughters of the American Revolution, has looked into repairing the Confederate sign. The cost to repair the aluminum is \$1,625. The State will pay \$2,300 for new bronze markers, \$1,275 to restore old ones (ours are aluminum). Right now they are bidding for state contracts. Ms. Hardaway suggests that we wait on repairing the sign. Bethany Major stated she needs to look into the sign repairs closer and try to get the State involved. Mayor Rogers stated that Senator Harris, the representative of the transportation cabinet in the state senate, would be a good person to call. Also, it may be possible to claim the Confederate Cemetery sign on insurance.

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**Dana Barrette** (Insurance/Storm Water): No report given.

**Amy Johnson** (Communications/Sidewalks): Amy Johnson reported that the oral history project is ready to upload to the website. A total of \$6,000 in expenses are still coming in.

Amy Johnson also reported that she is collecting bids for landscaping the park and will also involve John Malueg, Stantec, for storm water drainage issues.

Amy reported that the sidewalk budget is out of money. We are awaiting additional funds from Frankfort.

## OLD BUSINESS

**Ordinance Amending Certain Sections of the Oldham County Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance (Scenic Corridor), Ordinance #4, Series 2009** - John Singler completed the first draft for the first reading of the design guidelines for the Scenic Corridor. This was the first reading by summary as presented by John Singler. The ordinance simply amends certain sections of the Oldham County zoning code with scenic corridors designated. The design guidelines for those scenic corridors are reserved and what the ordinance does is fills in the gap and creates the design guidelines for the scenic corridors that

run through Pewee Valley.

Dick Filippini motioned to accept the draft for the first reading. The motion was seconded by Dana Barrette. All Council members voted in favor.

**Ordinance Adopting the Recommendation of the Oldham County Planning Commission Amending the Oldham County Comprehensive Zoning Regulations, Docket Number PZ-08-013, Ordinance #3, Series 2009** - John Singler presented by summary a second reading of the various amendments to the zoning code. A copy was mailed to the Council members of the changes. Mr. Singler reported Mayor Rogers gave the only comment to the changes which was regarding issues with the previous code amendments, i.e., how do we put in writing the issues with the Oldham County Sewer Board and septic tanks? Three paragraphs of language that was used in the previous amendments was found in old ordinances and added to the current ordinance. This amendment is a change to the zoning ordinance that is suggested by the County, so it is incumbent upon them to enforce it. The members of the Joint Zoning Board have been given the same recommendations to pass throughout the county. It was noted that Pewee Valley is the last to approve the recommendations.

A motion to adopt the Ordinance was made by Dana Barrett. The motion was seconded by Dick Filippini. A roll call vote was taken. All Council members voted in favor.

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## NEW BUSINESS

**Storm Water Project** - Dana Barrette introduced John Maleug of Stantec, to give a summary of the January meeting regarding Storm Water. The first task is to assist the City of Pewee Valley in developing an individual Phase 2 Storm Water permit, to comply with the requirements of the Clean Water Act. The second task is to develop a sustainable funding source to fund these type of Storm Water programs. A summary packet from January's meeting was distributed in advance to the Council members. Mr. Maleug went over the information from January:

\*Stantec is working with the City and the Storm Water permit and its elements to understand what services are needed to provide to support that permit. Once these are identified, then the City will be able to justify a fee if we do move forward with some type of fee.

\*The Storm Water permit has 6 different parts called "Minimum Control Measures."

MCM #1 focuses on existing tools to get the message out: City's website, Call of the Pewee, billing inserts, updates to elected officials, etc.

MCM#2 looks forward to putting together a Storm Water Committee, looking at existing projects, and demonstration projects (such as a park area developed in a way that demonstrates to home owners how to develop their own personal parcel in a way that protects the environment and manages storm water runoff.

MCM #3 addresses elicit discharge detection

and elimination, the first element of which is to develop an ordinance using existing community groups – like the Tree Board – for identification, developing a storm water hotline, putting together a storm water map that shows where the water goes when it drains.

MCM#4 deals with construction site runoff. This discussion came about because Pewee Valley is unique in that we don't have large parcels being developed at any one time. Consideration is being given to managing it down to a 20,000 square feet or larger disturbance area – once over 20,000 square feet is disturbed, we may want to consider some type of erosion control to ensure sediment doesn't wash off site. We may want to require a gravel rock going into the construction site so that dirt and mud is not being pulled out to the city streets.

MCM#5 -- post construction storm water management. This is one of the bigger items typically in most cities. Again because we don't have that much large, new development going on, the purpose is simply to manage storm water runoff after a site has been developed.

MCM#6 -- in this first draft of our permit is that we are committing to provide outreach to homeowners.

Mr. Maleug reported that at the meeting between Stantec and members of the City Council details of what a storm water utility might include will be addressed, along with organizational

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structure, level of service, and cost of service on an annual basis, types of rates/fees structure that would support funding, billing mechanism, rate structure, and finally, timeline for offering credits and adjustments.

A Notice of Intent was sent to the State on the City's storm water project. The County has mailed out their first storm water bills. John Singler stated that once we understand what storm water includes, the rate structure, etc., we can develop a timeline for billing. It is anticipated that a draft will be ready late this month.

**City Emergency Shelter** – Dick Filippini submitted his concern for an emergency shelter (or satellite county emergency shelter) at Town Hall - with a gas-powered automatic generator. Mayor Rogers indicated that without full-time city personnel, and other necessary health requirements, Town Hall is not a possible shelter. Mayor Rogers suggested that Mr. Filippini talk with Kevin Nuss, Oldham County Emergency Management, within the next 30 days and work

to pre-designate such a shelter before another storm or emergency necessitates its use.

**2009--2010 Fiscal Year Budget** – Mayor Rogers asked that Council members begin to look at the budget for the next fiscal year (and prepare for flat revenues).

City Clerk – Dana Barrette made a motion to hire Laura Eichenberger for the City Clerk position. The motion was seconded by Bethany Major. All Council members voted in favor of the motion. Laura Eichenberger was sworn in office by John Singler directly following the meeting.

Upon approval of payment of outstanding bills, the Council voted unanimously to adjourn.

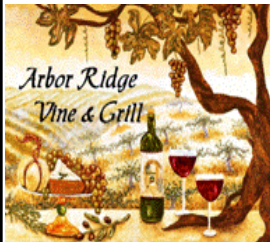

thousands of dollars in taxes and fees, the Mayor felt it was unfair for the County to insist on such an agreement. He also felt we could get a cheaper price by contracting with a firm directly. Because Ash and Central are state roads, they were not included in the City's contract with Clean Cut Trees.

Now that the bulk of the work has been completed, Mayor Rogers and the Town Council would like to thank the residents for being so kind to those individuals who spent so many long hours cleaning up our City streets.

## ARBOR DAY

The City of Pewee Valley has again been named a Tree City USA community by the Arbor Day Foundation. The Mayor will read the Arbor Day proclamation at the Town Council Meeting on April 6th, with that day being designated as Arbor Day in our Town. A tree will be planted in honor of the celebration in the right-of-way on Central Avenue

In year's past, the town held a "Trash for Trees" Arbor Day Celebration, but due to budget constraints, the City will not be able to give away trees to residents this year. The City is, however, encouraging everyone to join in the celebration by planting a tree in their own yard.

## STIMULUS FUNDS

The Oldham Era recently reported that Oldham County will receive more than \$1 million worth of economic stimulus money, which includes a pedestrian bridge over Interstate 71 along Ky. 146 and sidewalks between Ky. 329 and the bypass in Crestwood.

The stimulus package also freed up \$31 million in the state budget for road projects in Oldham County. Ky. 393 from I-71 to north of Ky. 146 will be widened and a bike and pedestrian path from LaGrange to the Jefferson County line will be constructed, to name a few.

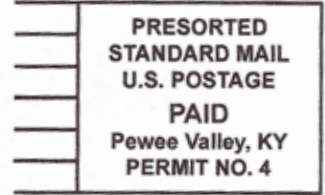
