

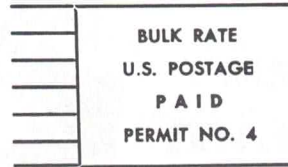

MAY COUNCIL MEETING

CITIZENS' CONCERNS

One citizen showed the Council fiber optic wire that she had collected from various sites in the city which had been discarded by contractors from Insight Communications. She stated that the left over wire could cause

A special meeting of the City of Pewee Valley, Ky., City Council was held on Monday, May 7, 2001, at 7:00 p.m. to discuss expenditure of the restricted funds, LGAF and Municipal Road Aid fund, for the 2001-02 fiscal year. In attendance were Nathan Stewart, Kevin Fuqua, Peter Johnson, and Suzanne Schimpeler. Also in attendance were Mayor Jim Kincer and City Clerk Barbara Webster. Jim Marquardt, Roy Smith and City Attorney John Frith Stewart were absent. The anticipated new funds are \$21,000 and may only be used for road and drainage improvements. The public was asked for input. One citizen requested expenditure to fix on-going drainage problems and shoulder work on Tulip Ave. There being no more discussion, the special meeting was adjourned.

The Town Hall bell was rung at 7:15 P.M. on Monday, May 7, to open the fifth regularly scheduled City Council meeting for the year 2001.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The Treasurer's report was read showing a combined operating account and Municipal Plus Account balance of \$493,746.32,

That's the likeness of Bill Herdt used to make the plaque unveiled April 22 at the dedication of new firehouse on Foley Avenue. The plaque honors Mr. Herdt's 72 years of "service, loyalty, and generosity" to the fire department, said Chief Tim Kehl. The new \$900,000, 8,100-square-foot station will eventually have dormitory rooms upstairs where some volunteers will live. Leslie Ellis of *The Courier-Journal* reported that "more than 100 people turned out for the reception and ceremony, at which a surprised Mr. Herdt saw for the first time the plaque that will hang in the lobby of the station.... Mr. Herdt recalled that the original fire station 'was just wide enough and long enough to get a truck and a coal stove in it'; he was 13 when he joined and 15 when he started driving the department's Ford Model T truck to fires. It had three 30 gallon tanks, which had to be refilled by a bucket brigade with water from wells or cisterns. Volunteer firefighters shared one ax; they had no protective clothing." property damage and physical harm if run over by a lawn mower. Mayor Kincer will contact the cable company about the potential hazard. Another citizen questioned why Pewee Valley is located in a non-attainment area (restricting open burning) when the rest of Oldham County is not. The Mayor appointed Nathan Stewart and Jim Brewer to investigate the criteria for drawing non-attainment boundaries. Another citizen supported the creation of an Historical Overlay District for Pewee Valley; he has worked with such a concept in other areas of the country and feels that this could protect Our Town in the face of rapid development in Oldham County. A citizen expressed disappointment that no council member attended the recent dedication of the new Pewee Valley fire station.

OTHER BUSINESS

Officer John Meadors gave the police report. There were 39 citations, 26 warnings and one accident. He also reported that he has completed a Block Watch program with the residents of Edgewood Manor. If any other subdivision or street wants to initiate a Block Watch program, Officer Meadors is eager to assist.

Mayor Kincer appointed Nancy Nemeth (Council member Schimpeler's sister) as the new Town Greeter. The Mayor asked for suggestions for a citizen to fill the position of City Tax Collector, which will become vacant on July 1, 2001. Anyone interested in this job should call the Mayor as soon as possible (241-6889.)

The Council next went into executive session to discuss potential litigation, as provided by the Kentucky Open Meetings Act. Following the executive session, the

Mayor resumed the public session of the Council.

Council member Johnson reported that "Trash for Trees" day was successful. Two dumpsters were filled, and 82 trees were given away to the citizens. Other citizens were disappointed because no trees were available after the initial give-away at 10:00 a.m. The Council agreed that it might be a good idea to sponsor the tree give-away program again because it was so well-received.

Council member Stewart reported that two new culverts on Maple have been installed, as well as a big drain at the corner of Maple and Rebel. Drain work has been completed at the top of Cherry Hill and on one side of Stoney Creek Road, with the other to be completed soon. A crushed culvert has been replaced on Tulip. Construction plans have been completed to extend Peace Lane to Wooldridge Ave. Mr. Stewart recently spoke with the State about the hole in front of the Salem Church; the State stated that repairs there would begin the week of May 7th.

Ms. Schimpeler submitted an Historical Overlay Plan used in Wilmington, De. She has spoken with Representative Tim Feeley concerning funding. Several citizens have volunteered to serve on an Historical Overlay committee. At Mayor Kincer's request, Ms. Schimpeler will try to obtain additional Historical Overlay examples; there are 25 in use in Kentucky. The Mayor suggested obtaining plans used for Anchorage, LaGrange, and another city in the state, possibly Harrodsburg.

Mayor Kincer thanked Council member Fuqua for his work on planning the new budget. The City Attorney and Mr. Fuqua gave the first reading of Ordinance No. 2,

Series 2001, the 2001-02 City Budget ordinance. A special meeting will take place on May 14 at 7:00 p.m. to have the second reading and enactment (The budget will be published in *The Oldham Era* at least 30 days prior to its effective date of July 1, 2001. The City Attorney also gave the first reading of the Taxing Ordinance, Ordinance No. 3, Series 2001, under which the tax rate will remain the same at \$.18 per \$100 of property value. The second reading and enactment of Ordinance No. 3 will also take place at the special meeting on May 14.

Ms. Schimpeler reported that she is gathering ideas for the annual Pewee Valley summer festival and will propose a festival date at the next Council meeting. She is also working on new street signs for the City.

Mayor Kincer recognized Boy Scout, Jeremy Smith, who attended the meeting.

Mr. Fuqua informed the Council that the General Fund is owed monies from the Municipal Road Aid Fund in repayment of a loan made to the road fund several years ago. Now that the Municipal Road Aid Fund has the resources, the Council voted to require repayment of the loan in the amount of \$10,849.

In response to a citizen's inquiry, Mayor Kincer reported that he is working with county Police Chief Hicks to create a police substation in the old fire house as well as providing housing for an EMS vehicle.

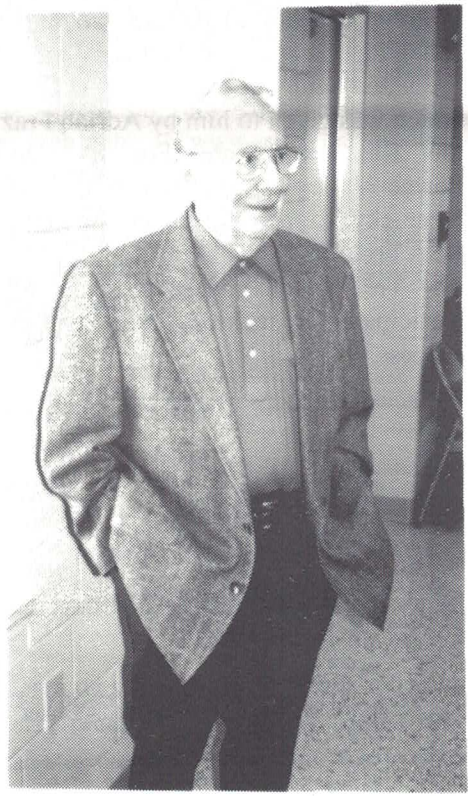

In recognition of our new firehouse and the dedications of all those who staff it, we'll be introducing our volunteer firefighters to you in the coming months. This issue, meet Sam Campbell and Carol Akers.

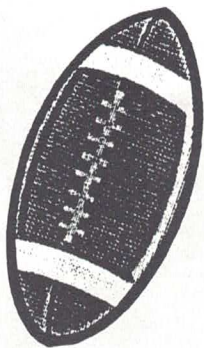


Sam Campbell, 33, joined the volunteer fire department when he was 16 years old. He is married to Teresa Campbell and has one son who attends Crestwood Elementary School. Like the other Pewee Valley volunteers, he trains at least three hours a week, on Wednesday nights; he has worked for the South Oldham Department; and he also attends state fire fighting schools as his schedule permits. Why does he do it? "To help out the people of my community," he says. He has to pass medical fitness testing each year and at the Wednesday night training sessions climbs ladders and engages in simulated fire combat to stay in shape. In "real life," Mr. Campbell operates a hardwood flooring company, with installation and refinishing, from his home.



Carol Akers joined the Pewee Valley Department when she moved back to this community eight years ago, at the urging of one of her close high school buddies, Chief Tim Kehl. She is a fire fighter and an engineer for the Department, which means that in addition to basic training, she attended six months of classes every Saturday evening to perfect the techniques required to drive the fire engines. She is the single mother of three children, ages 7, 9, and 12, all of whom are enrolled in Oldham County schools. When asked what her most frightening moment as a fire fighter has been, she replied that being inside a fire for the first time, and the attendant feeling of disorientation, was disturbing. She once fell through a burning floor, landing, luckily, in a crawl space. In her last fire, she realized, she was no longer afraid; she has, she says, been fortunate to work with good officers whom she trusts implicitly.

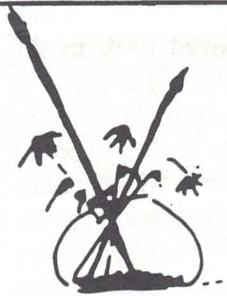

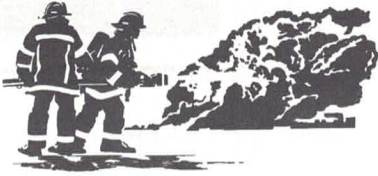

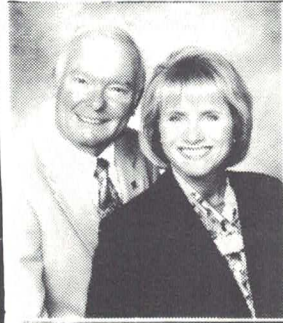
