

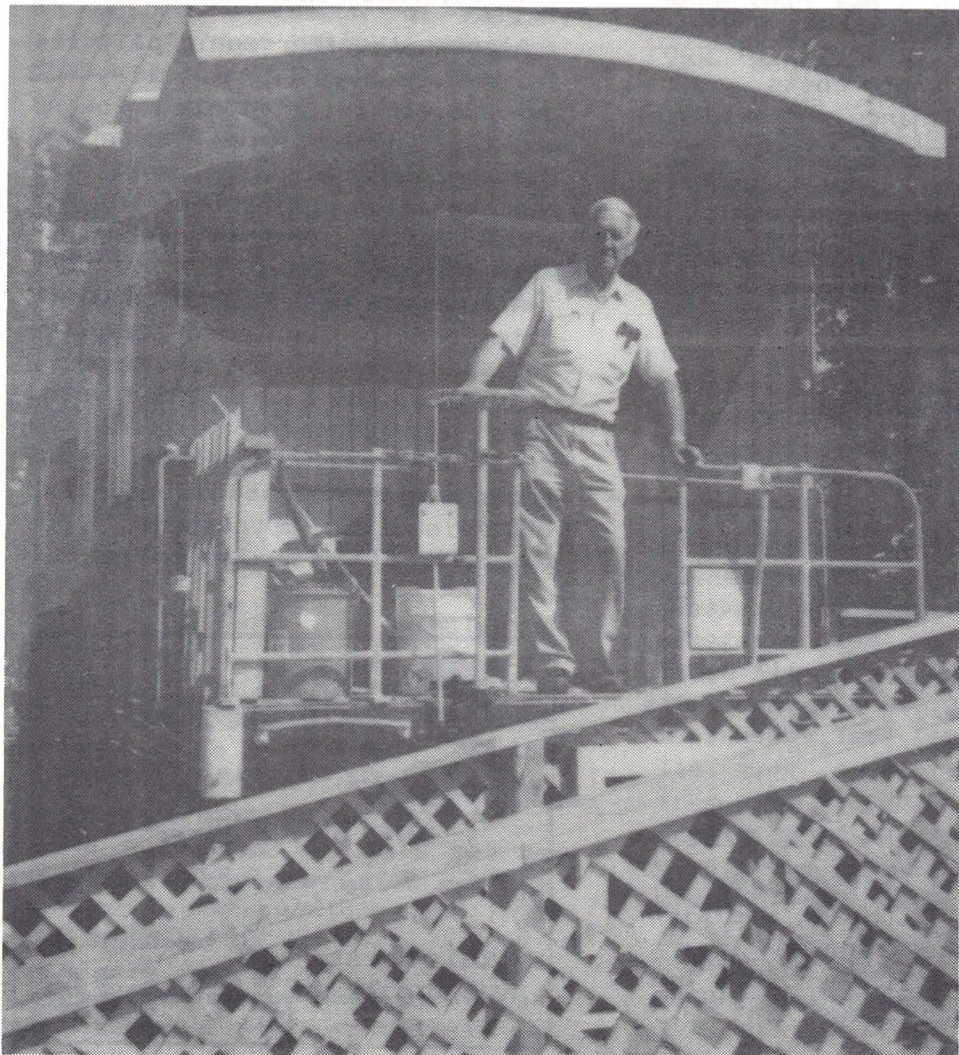

PREPARING FOR A VOICE IN CABLE-TV RATES

Cable TV's basic rate in Pewee Valley - but only the basic rate - will be controlled by a City ordinance that was given first reading at the City Council meeting on Oct. 4.

Second reading and passage of the ordinance are scheduled for the next Council meeting, Nov. 1.

The City hopes to take advantage of recent federal legislation that gives municipalities more leverage in controlling basic cable costs.

A second ordinance, providing for establishment of a Cable Rate Commission, which would oversee the charges for basic cable TV equipment and services, also was given first reading.

ANNUAL CITY AUDIT

Contract for the annual audit of the City's financial records has been awarded by the City Council to Welenken Himmelfarb & Co. of Louisville on a bid of \$1,425.00. This is the same CPA firm that performed the previous audit. Pewee Ray Ludwick is a member of the firm and will be in charge of the work. The audit covers the fiscal year ended last June 30.

NO NEWS YET IN TOOT SUIT

Status of the City's appeal of the Circuit Court decision disallowing the ban on train-tooting: It's still pending, but no news (is good news?) at this time.

A CONTRIBUTION TO 9-1-1

Along with other municipalities in the county, Pewee Valley has agreed to contribute toward capital expenditures made by Oldham County Dispatch, mostly to replace aging equipment.

OCD is the agency that answers when you call 9-1-1.

After hearing a report on OCD's deteriorating equipment by its director, Jim Morris, at the Oct. 4 meeting, the City Council voted to join other cities in contributing 1.55% of the Police Department's operating budget to OCD's capital-improvements fund for each of the next five years.

After a long period of temporary tenants, it looks as if the Red Caboose in the center of town is about to house something that was never even thought about when it was hoisted into place 22 years ago.

It has been a shop with gifts and snacks, an architectural office, and a roofing-company office.

Originally, it was considered to become a museum of railway items and Pewee Valley mementoes. Some folks even thought of it as just a playground - a place for the town's young folk to climb aboard and go roaming in their imagination to far-way places.

But now the Pewee Valley Police Department is just about to take over the Caboose as its permanent headquarters.

The Caboose is being outfitted, inside and out, as our police station of the future, with Pewee Paul Staniford as the contractor and City Councilmember Kathie Hodge as coordinator, with of course, input from Chief Larry Walls.

The project - including electricity, phone service, insulation and ventilation (benefits the Caboose never had before), is expected to be completed in time for the police to move in within a month.

And when they do, this may be one of the very few police stations in the world housed in a caboose.

The Police Department's move to the Caboose will result in a change in the space in the Town

Hall. The Chief's office, in back of the City Council meeting room, will be added to that space, which has been crowded at times when visitors come in. It is anticipated that a partition will be removed to create a larger room.

WHAT'S THE HURRY?

Citations for speeding averaged more than two a day - a total of 77 - in September, according to the monthly report of police activities from Chief Larry Walls. An additional 57 warnings were issued.

Other citations included: disregarding railroad signals (3, including 1 for a signalman for CSX Transportation), expired license plates (3), disregarding stop sign, no license plate and operator's license not on person (2 each), reckless driving, improper passing, no tail light and no operator's license (1 each).

Our policemen made 93 runs for a variety of reasons during the month, among them: snake in house (2), prowlers (3), wires down (4), search for prison escapee (4), domestic violence (2), loose horse (2), tampering with mail (1), open doors (12), walk-aways from Friendship Manor (2), suspicious vehicles (9), suspicious persons (5), criminal mischief (3), trespass (3), and theft (2).

Police also investigated 4 motor accidents, one with injury, and assisted 9 motorists in various ways.

HERE AGAIN; THE PEOPLE ON THE BALLOT FOR CITY OFFICES

The general election is right around the corner - Tuesday, Nov. 2.

So here's a little reminder about City offices on the ballot:

Mayor: Vivien H. Reinhardt is up for re-election, unopposed, for her third 4-year term.

City Council: Six seats to be filled from among nine candidates - four incumbents, John Bishop, William Durham, Walter Hayes and Kathie Hodge, and five others, Mark Abrams, Bruce Bolton, Alan Gould, Robert E. Lee and Steve Reeves.

(In a county-wide race for jailer, another Pewee, Bob Payne, is on the ballot.)

Information about the candidates for City Council was given in last month's "Call of the Pewee." Councilmembers serve a 2-year term.

Neither the mayor nor councilmembers are paid for the time and energy they devote to the City.



PERMISSION FOR A BURIAL

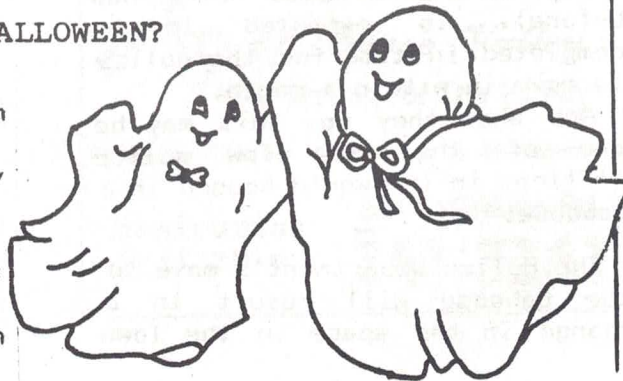

EARLY-WARNING FLU SHOTS

Flu shots are being given out earlier than expected this year, due to an outbreak in Louisiana.

The Oldham County Health Department received word Monday from the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta about giving the shots earlier this year.

The health department, located on Jefferson Street in LaGrange, will begin giving flu injections on Wednesday, Oct. 13. Shots will be given each Monday and Wednesday from 1 to 4 p.m., with the exception of Monday, Oct. 25.

Shots, which cost \$3, will be given on a first-come, first-served basis until supplies are gone. If you have a medical card, be sure to bring it.

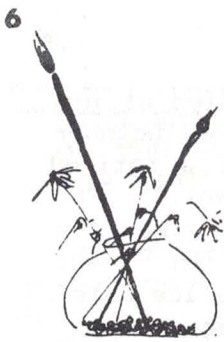

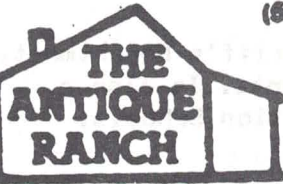
