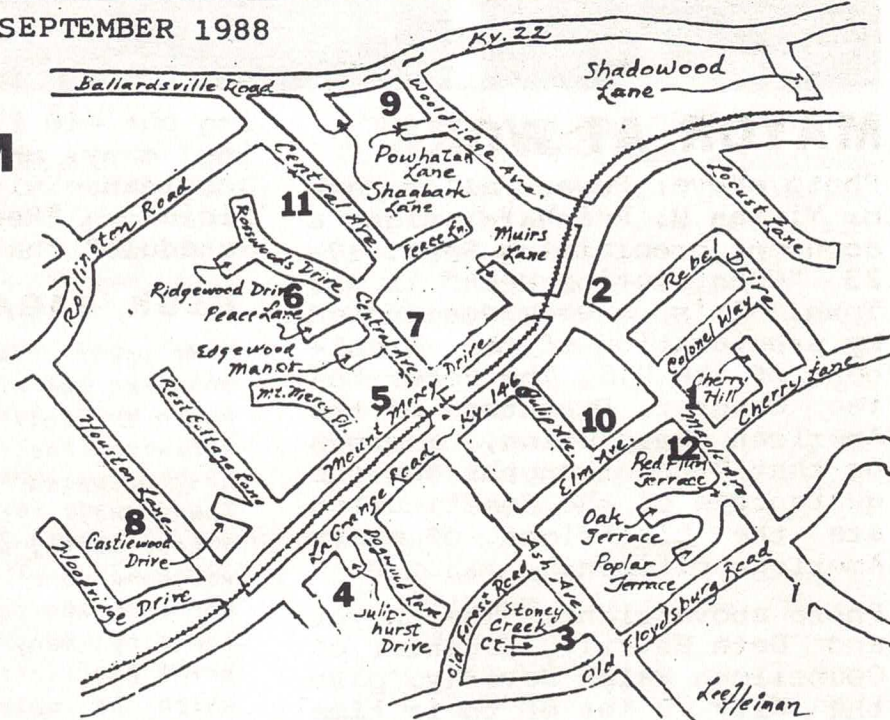

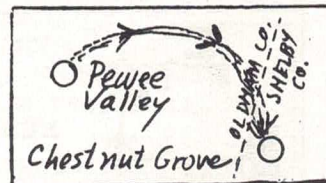

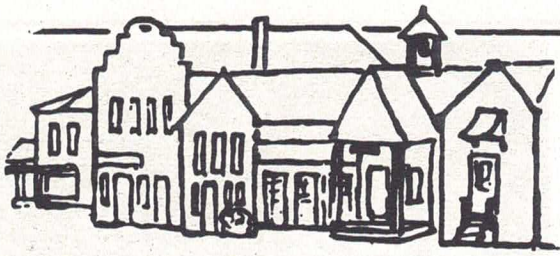

BIG NEW ONE FOR EDGEWOOD

Oldham County Planning & Zoning Commission has issued a permit for construction of a new house in Edgewood Manor Subdivision off Central Avenue.

The house will be built for Bruce Gaddie at 104 Sunnyside Court by Ron Petaja. It's a four-bedroom residence measuring 84x73 feet.

BEER-CAN HEAVER AT LARGE

Somebody threw a beer can at a car last month, and if he's ever caught he'll be charged with criminal mischief.

That's one of the items on Chief Larry Walls' report on police activities in August. Police issued seven speeding citations and one for alcohol intoxication during the month, and investigated two non-injury accidents, neither involving Pewees.

AUDITOR FOR THIS YEAR

The contract for auditing of City financial records has been awarded by the City Council to Thomas M. Kamer of LaGrange on a low bid of \$840. His was one of three bids received.

STREET PROJECTS UNDER WAY

Councilman John Bishop, the City's road commissioner, has undertaken these projects this month:

Patching potholes on Maple and Wooldridge Avenues and Cherry Lane; removing tree limbs on the Wooldridge drainage areas, and placing a warning marker at Maple and Rebel Drive to protect a culvert.

Considerable clearing of weeds and brush has been done in recent weeks along Cherry Lane and Wooldridge.

ABOUT THAT TRAFFIC LIGHT...

The request of City Council for input on a traffic signal device at LaGrange Road and Ash Avenue in last month's "Call of the Pewee" was reported prematurely.

At its August meeting, the Council agreed to ask the State Department of Highways to study this intersection as part of an effort to address the traffic congestion and safety problems on LaGrange Road in our city.

Once the results of the study are received, the Council plans to review any suggestions the State may make, and if the Council recommends any course of action, it will hold a public hearing to solicit community input.

The Council appreciates the input received thus far. Though premature, it will be retained for later consideration, pending Council direction.

Saturday, Oct. 1: OUR TOWN'S OWN GREAT BALLOON RACE

It's "Down the Road to Chestnut Grove" on Saturday, October 1.

What used to be an annual hot-air balloon race originating in Pewee Valley will be revived on that date, with lift-off at about 4:30 p.m. Destination: Chestnut Grove, a bit across the line in Shelby County.

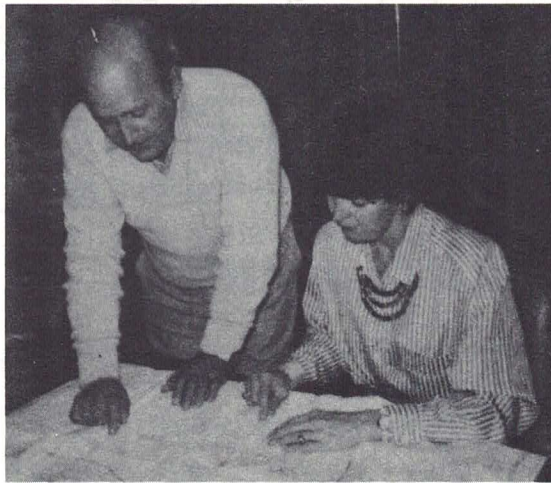
Twelve locations in town have been designated as launch sites, forms will be available to register for a free balloon ride on another date, to be decided by the winner and the balloonist.

Also at the sites, area maps showing the relative locations of Pewee Valley and Chestnut Grove will be available as souvenirs and to guide those who may wish to take part by car in the "chase".

You can also follow the race by tuning into Radio Station WKX (105.7 on the FM dial). It will be reported by Grand Balloon Master John Randolph of WKX, who will be riding in one of the race balloons.

This race is sponsored by the City of Pewee Valley, the Crestwood State Bank and the Citizens Fidelity Bank and Trust Company of Pewee Valley.

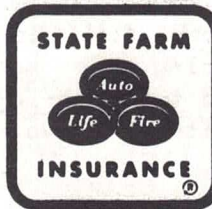

FATAL FIRE ON CHERRY HILL

A fire on Aug. 13 at the home of U.S. Bankruptcy Judge G. William Brown, 211 Cherry Hill Lane, took the lives of the judge and a friend, Mary Ellen Stansbury, as a result of smoke inhalation. Mrs. Stansbury was the widow of former Louisville Mayor William B. Stansbury.

The blaze, which may have been caused by an extension cord, was reported by neighbors at 12:41 a.m. Pewee Valley volunteer firefighters were first to arrive, and the fire was under control at 1:05. The South Oldham Fire Department was called to assist.

The Pewee Valley volunteer firemen wish to thank the residents of Cherry Hill for providing them with coffee, juice, and donuts in the early morning hours as they worked at the site after the fire was extinguished.

DEATH OF A FORMER RESIDENT

John H. Heller, a former Pewee Valley resident on Maple Avenue, died at age 58 on Aug. 29 in Wisconsin, where he resided. Among those surviving are his mother and father, Adeline and Frank Heller.

THE HENDRICKS FAMILY

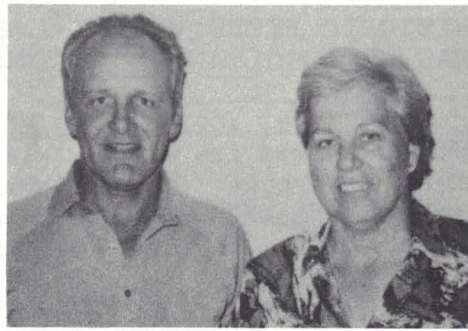
