SEPTEMBER COUNCIL MEETING

The regular meeting of the City Council of Pewee Valley, Kentucky was held on September 10, 2009. In attendance were Mayor Bob Rogers, Council Members Dick Filippini, Bethany Major, Will Chambers, and Carol Akers. Also in attendance were City Clerk, Laura Eichenberger and Attorney James Hodge (Hodge & Singler) sitting in for John Singler. Council Members Dana Barrette and Amy Johnson were absent.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Mayor Rogers reported in Dana's absence. McIntyre & Wooldridge is the firm conducting the independent audit for fiscal year beginning June 30, 2008 and ending June 30, 2009. The audit is in process and will be published once it is complete.

OPEN COMMENTS

Resident Don Helton brought forth a concern regarding the insurance premium tax collected by the City. Mr. Helton stated that at the time he served on the City Council the insurance premium tax was set at 5%. There was an attempt to raise it to 10% and to set aside the money for the purpose of sewers. But, on the final reading, a second to the motion was never given to raise the premium, so the measure died. Mr. Helton further stated that the first action taken by the new Council was to take up the second reading and it passed the measure to raise the insurance tax to 10%. He asked if the money was still to be set aside for sewers.

Mr. Helton noted he sent an e-mail to Mayor Rogers posing this question. The Mayor responded that he does not check e-mail frequently and that he is available by home phone (241-7340) and cell phone (287-8655). The City Treasurer can also be contacted. Mr. Helton stated that he thought it bad that people cannot communicate with the City Council. Councilwoman Majors re-

sponded that the Council will find out the answer to the issue and respond back to Mr. Helton.

Resident David Kozal commented that he agrees with Mr. Helton. Mr. Kozal asked if we could publish the City's reserve amount in the minutes and if there is a specific application of the reserve. He added that the budget is on the City's website and wondered if we could do the same for the reserve account.

Resident Tamara Sanderson stated that she was afraid to comment because of the note about open comments in *The Call of the Pewee*. When do we get to hear specific answers to comments and questions presented at the Council Meetings? And how can other people find out the answers to the questions so that everyone is aware of the answers? Mayor Rogers stated that everyone on the Council has their contact numbers listed. Mayor Rogers further stated he "doesn't want anyone to be intimidated." Bethany noted that she gets both phone calls and e-mails from residents with questions; and that the Council will talk about how best to communicate (website, *The Call of the Pewee*, etc.) questions and answers.

FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT

No report given.

POLICE REPORT

Chief Mike Losik commented that as summer comes to a close and the children are back in school, we must be mindful to watch our speed and always expect the unexpected.

The last edition of *The Call of the Pewee* contained a page noting necessary items to have on hand in case of an emergency. Based on what we have experienced over the past year, he added that we can all benefit by supplying our homes and autos with the things recommended on this sheet. This is probably the best reference handout he has ever seen. Copies were made for those who may have failed to save it and are available by calling Town Hall. Hats off to Paula Kennedy, the editor of *The*

Call of the Pewee for providing our residents with such helpful information.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

John Foster, reporter for The Oldham Era, assigned to Pewee Valley, is attending his last Council Meeting with us. He and his wife are moving to Peru to provide teaching and maintenance services in an orphanage. A round of applause and well wishes were given for John and his wife.

While at the State Fair, Mayor Rogers ran into Kenneth Breunig who donated an antique Pewee Valley Fire Department badge to the City. The fire engine depicted on the badge has spoke wheels. This raised the question for Bethany on how and where to display the badge.

The City inquired with the Oldham County Health Department regarding satellite flu shot clinics for the 2009 flu season. Due to the anticipated spread of H1N1 virus, the Health Department will not hold satellite clinics; however, two seasonal flu shot clinics have been scheduled: September 18th, 8:30 am to 1:30 pm, and October 22nd, 8:00 am to 4:00 pm. Mayor Rogers announced that the honor of first Property Tax/Water Quality Fee bills paid for 2009 goes to: 1st Place, George Farmer, and a very close 2nd Place, Marsha Chadwick.

Mayor Rogers announced that in response to the question and answer opportunities issue between residents, City Council Members, and the Mayor, he is re-instating the monthly "Mayor's Night In." This will provide the opportunity and appropriate forum for residents to pose their questions directly to the Mayor and provide another

avenue of communication to the City Council (i.e., questions raised that cannot be answered on the spot can then be researched by and addressed at the following monthly Council meeting). The "Mayor's Night In" questions and answers format will not be limited except for maintaining an appropriate level of respect in all exchanges. The date will be announced in *The Call of the Pewee* and posted on the website (www.peweevalleyky.org).

COUNCIL MEMBER REPORTS

Dick Filippini (Tree Board):

Dick reported that all tree trimming along Highway 146 is almost complete. The Tree Board met with CSX and followed their guidelines. There was a question about a dead tree along that area. If the tree is dead, the Tree Board will remove it.

Bethany Major (Town Hall/Festivities):

Bethany reported that a resident has asked the Council to reconsider using the Pewee Valley vehicle stickers again in the City (as was done in the recent past). The vehicle stickers were

originally set up when Chief Losik first came on board and helped him become acquainted with all the vehicles in the City. Chief Losik stated that the stickers do some good in helping identifying vehicles that belong to the community; but, reminded all residents that the stickers do not give permission to speed or not adhere to the traffic laws. They are simply a means of identification. Bethany will bring examples of possible stickers to the Council when all members are present to see if it is a project to be pursued.

Bethany reported that one landscaping bid has been received for the Park (there are still two bid requests out). Amy is continuing to work with John Maleug, Stantec.

Amy Johnson (Sidewalks/Communications):

Mayor Rogers reported for Amy that there are two sidewalk projects in process: Central around Rollington, heading up Central Avenue and Highway 146. Mel Milburn, City Engineer, is working on the State permits for Central Avenue, and will open the project for bids. Mel is also working on the bid package for the sidewalk on Highway 146 (this project must meet Federal guidelines).

Bob Rogers (Police/Roads):

Mayor Rogers reported a resident has requested the speed limit be lowered on Houston to 15 mph and the installation of speed bumps. It was suggested that those residents wanting the changes on Houston start a petition or gather feedback to bring to the next Council Meeting to address the concern.

Current Road Projects:

- Rollington (drainage)—received 5 bids
- Elm Avenue (installing curb at Elm and Maple)
- Oak Terrace (collapsed catch basin)—work starting soon
- Preliminary date for board drilling under train tracks at Mt. Mercy and Houston by Insight is September 28, 2009.

OLD BUSINESS

Second Reading---Ordinance 8, Series 2009. A motion for summary reading of Ordinance 8, Series 2009 was made by Dick Filippini, seconded by Bethany Major. All Council Members present voted in favor. James Hodge, acting City Attorney, provided the second reading, by council, by title, “Ordinance 8, Series 2009, An Ordinance Relating to the Closure of Tanglewood Place and a Portion of Allen Avenue.” This constitutes the second reading by summary. Will Chambers made the motion to adopt Ordinance 8, Series 2009, seconded by Dick Filippini. All Council Members present voted in favor to pass the Ordinance.

Second Reading---Ordinance 9, Series 2009. A motion for summary reading of Ordinance 9, Series 2009 was made by Dick Filippini, seconded by Bethany Major, with all Council Members present voting in favor. James Hodge, acting City Attorney, provided the second reading, by council, by title, "An Ordinance Converting a Section of Houston Lane to One-Way." This constitutes second reading by summary. A motion made to adopt Ordinance 9, Series 2009 was made by Dick Filippini, seconded by Bethany Major. A roll call vote was taken - Aye: Dick Filippini, Bethany Major, Will Chambers; Opposed: Carol Akers. The Ordinance passes 3 in favor, 1 opposed.

PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

At its most recent meeting, the Planning and Development Commission reviewed the Oldham County Master Plan for Parks and Recreation presented by Tim Curtis, Director for Parks and Recreation, and Emily Liu, Assistant Planning Director. The Master Plan was quite big and addresses every element you can think of. The Commission voted 11 in favor and none opposed. The Plan will be presented to Pewee Valley and LaGrange.

The Commission received an application for a zoning change from commercial to residential for a small property on Dawkins Avenue. The Commission voted 11 in favor with 1 abstention and the application was passed.

John Singler represented the City of Pewee Valley at the Planning and Development Commission meeting to present Pewee Valley Ordinance #4, Series 2009, An Ordinance Amending Certain Sections of the Oldham County Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance. The Commission voted 8 in favor and 4 against the Guidelines. The Guidelines passed and will return to the City Council for final acceptance.

The Planning Commission's September 22nd agenda includes an approval of a revised plan for 7408 Highway 329 area known as Independence Park. The zoning is R4, heavy residential. Also on the agenda are two requests for an extension on development plan (the current legal limit is two years).

NEW BUSINESS

First Reading: Ordinance 10, Series 2009.

This ordinance is specifically for the state highway department for the federal funds the City will receive for the sidewalk. Bethany Major made the motion for the summary first reading, seconded by Dick Filippini with all Council members present voting in favor. James Hodge, Acting City Attorney, presented the first reading by summary by title of "Ordinance 10, Series 2009, An Ordinance Setting Certain Standards for Competitive Bidding for Projects in Which Federal Funds are Used." No action necessary, passed to the next meeting.

Municipal Order 3-2009. A motion was made by Dick Filippini and seconded by Bethany Major for the reading of Municipal Order 3-2009, with all Council Members present voting in favor. James Hodge presented the summary of first reading by title, of "Municipal Order 3-2009, Adoption of Water Quality User Fee Policy." This constitutes first reading by summary and is now ready for action. A motion to adopt Municipal Order 3-2009 was made by Dick Filippini, seconded by Carol Akers with all Council Members present voting in favor.

Resolution and Grant Acceptance Agreement of the City of Pewee Valley (Grantee) Accepting the Grant, Approving the Grant Agreement, Authorizing the Amendment of Local Budget, and Authorizing a Representative to Sign All Related Documents. Mayor Rogers reported that the same clerical error which sent the \$200,000 Ash Avenue flood study grant intended for Oldham County to the City of Pewee Valley now has to be corrected with the State. This Resolution and Grant Acceptance Agreement with the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority turns over the grant money to the County with the stipulation that it is to be used only to address the flooding on Ash Avenue. Dick Filippini asked if all \$200,000 has to be spent on that study. James Hodge responded that the grant is made on the estimate. If they can produce the study for less than the grant then the remaining grant money can be used toward resolving the study findings.

Dick Filippini motioned for the summary reading, seconded by Bethany Major. All Council Members present voted in favor. James Hodge presented the summary first reading of "Resolution and Grant Acceptance Agreement of the City of Pewee Valley (Grantee) Accepting the Grant, Approving the Grant Agreement, Authorizing the Amendment of Local Budget, and Authorizing a Representative to Sign All Related Documents" by title and this constitutes summary first reading by council. The motion to accept was made by Dick Filippini and seconded by Bethany Major with the Council Members present voting in favor.

Responding to the call for any other new business, Dick Filippini stated---regarding the issue of question and answer time, Mayor's Night In---that he is concerned with the issue of blame directed at the Mayor on issues and actions taken by the City Council on which the Mayor does not vote. The Houston Lane one-way, quiet zone issue is an example. Bob hasn't voted on anything to do with that particular issue---the entire Council voted. Dick further stated that he understands there are a lot of questions---we have discussed it ad nauseam---it has been in The Call of the Pewee, The Oldham Era, the Courier Journal, etc. Dick requested that comments or concerns be addressed to Council Members. There is a city directory with home and cell numbers, and e-mails are published in The Call of the Pewee. Dick also stated he does not want Mayor's Night In to turn into "beat up the mayor."

Upon approval of payment of outstanding bills, the Council voted unanimously to adjourn.

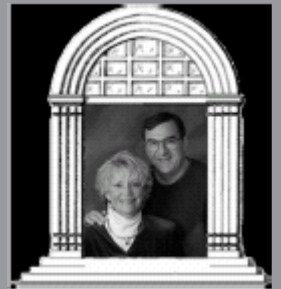

BURN BAN LIFTED

The Oldham County Partial Burn Ban runs from May 1 through September 30th. Effective October 1, residents in Oldham County are allowed to burn, however the ordinance states that "Burning should be done on days when conditions do not pose a threat of igniting a forest fire." Reasonable precautions must be taken by the person(s) setting the fire to prevent unwanted spread of fire and include: (1) burning shall occur only when prevailing winds direct smoke away from any residence, school, hospital or business; (2) the location of the burn should have adequate fire lanes to allow access for fire and emergency vehicles and heavy equipment; (3) must be attended at all times; and (4) have sufficient equipment on site to prevent the spread of fire.

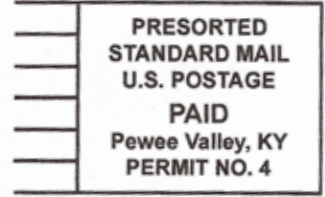
